He is nationally recognized for his sentinel research on rotator cuff tears, shoulder instability, and shoulder muscle transfers. He has experience in both academic and private practice settings. Dr. McMahon is currently the Chief of Orthopedic Surgery at Veterans Administration Pittsburgh Healthcare System. He teaches art of shoulder and elbow care to the fellow weekly in conferences and monthly in the operating room. He is truly an outstanding educator.

The shoulder and elbow fellow receives a high-quality education through hands on training in the office and operating room, weekly conferences, anatomic dissections, and open and arthroscopic model and cadaveric skill laboratories. The fellow rotates with Dr. McMahon a minimum of 1 day/month in the operating room focused on shoulder cases for the year. The fellow can choose to spend additional elective time with Dr. McMahon. The fellow is given 1 day/week for research, elective clinical time, or practicing surgical skills. Monies and time is provided to the fellow to attend 2 outside educational courses on shoulder and elbow surgery, coding, or the business of medicine.
